Epistle: 2 Corinthians 11:31-12:9 Gospel: Luke 8:26-39 Biblical, Sacramental, Patristic, Christ-centered, and Spirit-filled, *All Saints Orthodox Church* is a community of Orthodox Christians seeking to know and live the Gospel by putting on the Mind of Christ and acquiring the Holy Spirit. Pastoral Reflection

The Gospel is a message, and has a very specific meaning. The message of the Gospel is neither vague nor arbitrary. When the Apostles travelled the world spreading the Gospel, they were sharing a very clear, repeatable message. Many Christians, however, are not sure about the content of the Gospel message and, if asked, they could not say what it is. This is lamentable. As St. Paul teaches, "For though by this time you ought to be teachers, you need someone to teach you again the first principles of the oracles of God; and you have come to need milk and not solid food. For everyone who partakes only of milk is unskilled in the word of righteousness, for he is a babe." This is not said to anyone's shame, but to remind us of the importance of our role as Christians to be light to the world. Our work is to share the light of Christ. As Christ teaches: "No one lights a lamp and then hides it or puts it under a basket. Instead, a lamp is placed on a stand, where its light can be seen by all who enter the house." Without knowledge of the Gospel of Christ we cannot intelligently share Christ, for the Gospel is the foundational message. As Paul asks: "How shall they believe in Him of whom they have not heard?" What, then, is the Gospel message? In brief, it is that Christ died and rose from the dead, for you, and that apart from anything you have done He has borne your death, freely given you His eternal life, forgiven you all your sin, freed you from the curse of the Law, adopted you, qualified you to enter into the Kingdom of Heaven, and made you to partake of His divine nature. This is the Gospel that we receive by faith. It is vital that we learn it by heart and learn how to share it.

Wisdom, Let us Attend

The Church Fathers are a repository of living wisdom. One such Church Father is St. Paisios the Athonite. He taught:

The soft life makes people useless. Without toil and struggle sanctification doesn't come.

One way to understand this is rooted in God's purpose for our life: Holiness. It ought to be well-known that God has not saved us in order for our worldly comfort. His picture of us is as people with hearts burning deeply with the fires of holiness. For this reason, God allows all sorts of difficulties and pains in our life so that we can learn the root of holiness: humility. And yet, when the pains come we so often complain at the bitterness of our medicine, as if God the great Physician is not motivated by compassion for our true purpose in all that He does and allows. We forget our true purpose, and so resist the Healer of our souls when He tries to strengthen our faith by trials. No one gets stronger apart from resistance, and God wants us to bear the whole weight of His glory as living temples of His Holy Spirit. What a glorious destiny! And so to position us for blessing He allows trials in order to strengthen our faith. So let us not then kick against trials, but embrace them with the warming light of faith. God allows temptation so as to dust off our soul, for it to be purified through sorrows and weeping, so that we are forced to take refuge in God for our salvation. It is not that God wants us to be miserable, but we become miserable to the degree that we lose sight of our purpose here on earth, to become holy, to totally depend on God and His grace, to overcome the world with all its lust. Blows are necessary for the salvation of our souls, for they cleanse the soul. The more one hits and rubs clothing, the better it is cleaned. When we remember in the moment of trial that we are not reborn in Christ for worldly comfort but for holiness, then the trial becomes sweet, and we rejoice and are comforted spiritually. In other words, the sufferings of life prompt us to respond either with complaining or with faith. When we respond with faith, we are cleansed. But if we forget that we are here to become holy, we will suffer all the same, and instead of peace we will constantly feel only frustration and the misery of unmet assumptions.
