Sunday, December 1, 2019 Holy Prophet Nahum

Epistle: Ephesians 2:14-22 Gospel: Luke 18:18-27 Biblical, Sacramental, Patristic, Christ-centered, and Spirit-filled, *All Saints Orthodox Church* is a community of Orthodox Christians seeking to know and live the Gospel by putting on the Mind of Christ and acquiring the Holy Spirit. Pastoral Reflection

Christ is King. Christ is Lord. Christ is our Lord, your Lord and mine. This means that Christ has all authority. He is sovereign. All authority is His. There is no authority outside of Christ. As God, He has all power; He has all wisdom; He has all truth; He has all goodness; He has all life. There is no power, wisdom, truth, goodness, or life outside of Christ. To seek for power, wisdom, truth, goodness, or life apart from Christ is to put what is primary behind what is secondary. It is to have a god before God. Therefore, to have saving faith in Christ is to hand over one's life, one's affections, and all of one's hopes, on Christ alone. It is to seek for power, wisdom, truth, goodness, and life in Christ alone. It is to lay one's self, one's family, one's job, one's personal opinions, one's time, one's wishes, one's personal wisdom, at His feet. It is dedicating, consecrating one's whole being to God. It is refusing to live by any other value or principle. It is acknowledging Christ as the Personal Ruler and Lord over one's life, time, money, habits, hobbies, actions, investments, friendships, entertainment, work, everything. This alone is saving faith in Christ. If a person does not have this kind of faith, then they are still in thrall to sin and death. Christ alone is Savior. Faith is a living thing. Faith is a committed attitude towards Christ that He is the most valuable, the most beautiful, the most precious. Faith is not merely holding the idea that Christ is Lord, but personally obeying Him in all things as Lord. Anything less than this is seeking salvation outside of Christ. Some will conceal this truth, from themselves or others, but this only exposes them to the danger of damnation. Christ is our only Lord and Savior. Unless we give Him absolute authority over our life and choices, we have not yet acquired saving faith.

Wisdom, Let us Attend

The Church Fathers are a repository of living wisdom. One such Church Father is St. John Chrysostom (fl. 4th Century). He declared:

I would like to have a voice strong enough to make myself heard from the four corners of the world. I would climb the ugliest mountain of the universe and I would cry out to all men, "Save, Save your soul!"

Why would St. John have this desire? Few in the history of the Church have seen and written so clearly on the effects of sin. Sin is the most utterly destructive evil on earth. Sin is far worse even than the worst physical and emotional suffering because sin is an internal pollution of the soul that renders it incapable of receiving either heaven's joy or its eternal life. Sin hopelessly turns the soul in on itself in worldly, carnal perspectives and pursuits. Sin, of course, does not mean merely unethical or immoral actions, but actions which proceed from a state of unbelief and faithlessness. This faithlessness is the root sin, planted in the soil of pride and vanity, watered by sensualism, anger, and lust. Everything that is not of faith is sin, according to the unerring testimony of the Apostle Paul. Faithlessness is therefore destroying countless souls. Yet people typically think of themselves as good people, maybe not perfect, but more or less good people. Yet whose standard are they using? Are they judging themselves "mostly good" based on man's standard of goodness, or God's standard? A master of Scripture, St. John knows that God judges according to His own holy standard, and so rather than being judged by whether we were good according to what our peers think, say, or do, St. John knows God will judge according to His divine standard of holiness. Unless we are in Christ, every sin in our soul will confess its iniquity before God, and sensing the horror of this, St. John's heartery is for all men to turn to Christ for salvation. He states he would even expose himself to great danger and harm to excite men to salvation, and in his life he did just this, preaching God's standard, and was thus exiled and died so for it. If only we had this burning desire for souls to be saved! Many have little lively interest even in their own souls, much less the souls of others. Comfort, fear of man, and opinion too often stand as obstacles, but they will provide no solace on the Day of Judgment.
